

RULES FOR DISTRIBUTION
OF
INFORMATION BY MEMBERS

The following rules are established as the result of an amendment to the Virginia Condominium Act (Section 55-79.75:1). Any residents wishing to communicate between themselves and/or with the Board of Directors concerning Riverbend matters, may do so by following the options and rules listed below:

1. A written notice may be prepared for posting on the bulletin board located on the right wall in the mail room.
2. This notice must be no larger than the size of a half sheet of paper and is to be approved by Management, not for content but to be certain that it conforms to the size requirement and, also, because Management has the responsibility for posting the notices on this “locked” bulletin board. Additional copies of the notice and any attachments may be placed in the pamphlet holder next to the bulletin board. Such a communication display may remain on the bulletin board for a maximum period of 14 days.
3. Riverbend residents may also communicate with other residents by utilizing “UTD” (under the door) distribution on matters of concern to the Riverbend Association and/or the Board of Directors.
4. Any resident desiring not to receive any UTD other than *Around the Bend* and Management notices may go to the Management Office and request to have their name put on a list that will be made available to any individual, committee or group planning to use UTD for delivery of materials.

5. Any unit owner may initiate a process of soliciting signatures of support, via a written petition, that they wish to circulate. It is of primary importance that the issue being addressed in the petition be directly connected with the operation/function of the Riverbend building, the Association and/or the Board of Directors. No other “external” issues, i.e. political action or community issue outside of the Leisure World of Virginia are appropriate issues for such petition activities.
